In stick curling, two-person teams play a six-end game, throwing six rocks each end. The rock is delivered with a stick instead of sliding on the ice. It is a safer way to curl, with less sweeping and a focus on shot making. It's a short one-hour game - a good fit with today's busy lifestyle. Seniors are encouraged to come and try it out and bring out friends who might be interested.





## Foot Care for Seniors in 2024

Starting January 2024, the YK Seniors' Society will be offering *Foot Care for Seniors* once a month at the Baker Community Centre

With the generous donation of a 10K grant from the #314 Elks Lodge in Yellowknife, the YK Seniors Society is able to offer monthly foot care, a service that has been very limited for seniors in Yellowknife.

YKSS can offer this free program to seniors over the age of 60 and not currently receiving foot care. The *Footcare for Seniors* program will run once a month, January through December, 2024. Heather Moxon, a Certified Advanced Foot Care Nurse, will be on site to offer this specialized service.

#### Mike & Jean Piro

Mike and Jean both came to Yellowknife following World War II. Mike was an RCAF veteran and Jean worked in aircraft repair. They quickly became community pillars. Mike co-founded the Chamber of Commerce, Spirit YK, Float Plane Fly In, and, with Roger Zarudski, the original Flying Club. Jean was active in curling, basketball and baseball as well as community clubs.

They were involved in several businesses including Frame & Perkins garage, bus franchise, the Ford dealership, and the Prospector Bar and Grill.

Both Mike and Jean were strong supporters of tourism, regaling visitors with the colourful history of the city. Beyond their numerous contributions, they were known for their humility and advocacy. Balancing business and family, they remained dedicated to their community.
